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love it or hate it the five paragraph essay is perhaps the most frequently taught form of writing in classrooms of

yesterday and today but have you ever actually seen five paragraph essays outside of school walls have you ever found it in business writing journalism nonfiction or any other genres that exist in the real world kimberly hill campbell and kristi latimer reviewed the research on the effectiveness of the form as a teaching tool and discovered that the research does not support the five paragraph formula in fact research shows that the formula restricts creativity emphasizes structure rather than content does not improve standardized test scores inadequately prepares students for college writing and results in vapid writing in *beyond the five paragraph essay* kimberly and kristi show you how to reclaim the literary essay and create a program that encourages thoughtful writing in response to literature they provide numerous strategies that stimulate student thinking value unique insight and encourage lively personal writing including the following close reading which is the basis for writing about literature low stakes writing options that support students thinking as they read collaboration in support of discussion debate and organizational structures that support writing as exploration a focus on students writing process as foundational to content development and structure the use of model texts to write in the form of the literature students are reading and analyzing the goal of reading and writing about literature is to push and challenge our students thinking we want students to know that their writing can convey something important a unique view to share defend prove delight discover and inspire if we want our students to be more engaged skilled writers we need to move beyond the five paragraph essay

presents a rhetorically arranged reader that shows students how underlying rhetorical structures stimulate and direct clear thinking and effective writing this work also reflects the contemporary and practical work done on the interconnectedness of composition and cognition

drawing on engaging case studies essays in the history of canadian law brings the law to life the contributors to this collection provide rich historical and social context for each case unravelling the process of legal decision making and explaining the impact of the law on the people involved in legal disputes examining the law not simply as legislation and institutions but as discourse practice symbols rhetoric and language the book s chapters show the law as both oppressive and constraining and as a point of contention and means of resistance this collection presents new approaches and concerns as well as re examinations of existing themes with new evidence and modes of storytelling contributors cover many legal thematic areas from criminal to labour civil administrative and human rights law spanning english and french canada and ranging from the mid eighteenth century to the late twentieth century the legal cases vary from precedent setting cases to lesser known ones from those driven by one woman s quest for personal justice to others in which state actors dominate bringing to light how the people embroiled in these cases interacted with the legal system the book reveals the ramifications of a legal system characterized by multiple layers of inequality

this volume traces the historical evolution of american academic thought concerning public address what it is how it ought to be studied and what can be learned by engaging rhetorical texts in an analytical fashion to begin one must distinguish among three separate but interrelated uses of the term public address as practice theory and criticism the essays in this volume represent landmarks in the literal sense of that term they are marks on the intellectual landscape that indicate where scholars and ideas have passed and in that passing left a mark for future generations it is appropriate to revisit the landmarks that have set public address off as a field of study and it allows readers to remember the struggles that have led to the current situation most of the authors of the following chapters are deceased but their ideas live on transformed adapted modified rejected and reborn the scholarly dialectic continues what

constitutes a study in public address how best to approach rhetorical texts which analytical tools are required for the job how best to balance text with context and what role ought theory to play in the conduct or outcome of critical inquiry these questions live on to answer them at all is to engender debate and that is how it should be if the intellectual vitality of public address is to be maintained the papers are a prolegomenon to such studies for they mark where scholars have been and point the way to where they still must go

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
